

Arusha National Park



he park is the closest one to Arusha town, the WHAT TO DO safari capital of the North. The park is often overlooked by safari goers, despite offering - Forest walks, numerous picnic sites. the opportunity to explore a captivating diversity of - 3-4 days Mt. rn the middle of the forest stands the spectacular Ngurdoto Crater, whose steep, rocky cliffs Game drive: The whole year. enclose a wide marshy floor dotted with herds of buffalo and warthogs. At dusk and dawn the veil of clouds on the Eastern horizon is most likely to clear, revealing the majestic snow-capped peaks of Kilimanjaro.

GETTING THERE

An easy 40-minute drive from Arusha. Approximately 60 km from Kilimanjaro International Airport. The lakes, forest and Ngurdoto Crater can all be visited in the course of a half-day outing at the beginning or end of an extended Northern safari.


Lake Manyara National Park



Tretching for 50km along the base of the rusty- GETTING THERE gold 600-metre high Rift Valley escarpment, Lake Manyara is a scenic gem, with a setting By road, charter or scheduled flight from Arusha, extolled by Ernest Hemingway as "the loveliest I en route to Serengeti and Ngorongoro Crater. had seen in Africa". The compact game-viewing circuit through Manyara offers a virtual microcosm of WHAT TO DO the Tanzanian safari experience.

'nland of the floodplain, a narrow belt of acacia woodland is the favoured haunt of Manyara's Legendary tree-climbing lions and impressively tusked elephants. Squadrons of banded mongoose dart between the acacias, while the diminutive Kirk's dik-dik forages in their shade. Pairs of klipspringer are often seen silhouetted on the rocks above a field of searing hot springs that steams and bubbles adjacent to the lakeshore in the far south of the park.


anyara provides the perfect introduction to Tanzania's birdlife. More than 400 species have been recorded, and even a firsttime visitor to Africa might reasonably expect to observe 100 of these in one day. Highlights include thousands of pink-hued flamingos on their perpetual migration, as well as other large waterbirds such as pelicans, cormorants and storks.



Game drives, night game drives, canoeing when the water levels is sufficiently high. Cultural tours, picnicking, bush lunch/dinner, mountain bike tours, abseiling and forest walks on the escarpment outside the park.

WHEN TO GO

Dry season (July-October) for large mammals; Wet season (November-June) for bird watching, the waterfalls and canoeing.



Even when the migration is quiet, the Serengeti offers arguably the most amazing game-viewing in Africa: great herds of buffalo, smaller groups of elephants and giraffes, and thousands upon thousands of eland, topi, kongoni, impala and Grant's gazelle.

he scene of predator versus prey dominates Tanzania's greatest park. Golden-manned L lion prides feast on the abundance of plain grazers. Solitary leopards haunt the acacia trees lining the Seronera River, while a high density of cheetahs prowls the Southeastern plains. Around 500 bird species, ranging from the ostrich and

It is therefore the most accessible part of a 75,000 square kilometer tract of wilderness that stretches east almost as far as the Indian Ocean.

ions survey their grassy kingdom – and the zebra, wildebeest, impala and buffalo herds that migrate across it – from the flattened tops of termite mounds, or sometimes, during the rains, from perches high in the trees. pproximately 25,000 large animals, mostly Lungulates live in the crater. Large animals in the crater include the black rhinoceros, the local population of which declined from about 108 in 1964-66 to between 11-14 in 1995, and the hippopotamus. There also are many other ungulates: the wildebeest, zebra, the common eland, and Grant's and Thomson's gazelles. Impala are absent because the open woodland they prefer does not exist. Giraffe also are absent, possibly because of a lack of browse species. Cheetah, African wild dog and leopard are rarely seen.

When should I go?

Kilimanjaro is climbable all year round. The best months to climb are December-March, and September - October, which are the warmest and driest months. The next best are June to August, but they are colder. July, August, and September are the busiest months. Summiting on or soon after a full moon is very beautiful and helps illuminate the landscape without using headlamps. However, it is also very bright for sleeping and stars are not as visible.

Malaria is a serious problem in East Africa so you must consult your doctor about getting effective malaria prophylaxis for your visit. Many people are avoiding Lariam now-adays and using Malarone. You cannot catch malaria above 3000 meters on Kilimanjaro, but you must be careful below that altitude. particularly if you visit the coast where the strains of malaria tend to be especially vir-

What is the weather like on Mt. Kilimaniaro?

Temperatures range from 25 to 30 degrees Celsius at the foot of the mountain and -15 to -20 degrees Celsius on top plus wind chill. Lower down, it can be wet and humid, but higher up, there can be snow. Rain and snow may be encountered any time of the year!

How difficult is it to climb Kilimaniaro?

It requires no technical climbing experience, and any moderately fit person can summit the mountain.

Which route should I take?

Your decision will depend on where you want to sleep and the hiking distance each day and number of days of each route. On the Marangu Route, you sleep in huts with simple beds, while on all the other routes, you sleep in tents. There are two main routes on the mountain: the Marangu and Machame. You may also want to consider the Rongai Route as it is far less traveled. The Lemosho Route is a good choice if you want a longer route (8+ days).

Why is the Marangu route called the "Coca Cola" route? Is it really dirty and overcrowded?

There has been a lot of negative press about Marangu. In our view, and we arrange treks on all the routes, it is very unfair. This is the only route that uses huts rather than tents and some years ago there was a serious problem with overcrowding in the huts. In those years the Machame route was much less frequented. But we think the main reason that some operators speak against the Marangu and boost the Machame is that the booking system for Marangu is demanding of operators' time. There is no booking system for Machame (nor the other camping routes). You just show up at the Machame gate the first morning of the trek. No one ever knows how many people will be on the trail until the gate closes for that day. There is a daily quota of only about 70 climbers allowed to start on the Marangu route on any day (this is why booking is not always easy). There are many days in the season when there are many more

climbers on the Machame route than on the to the campsite for that day. Marangu. This is not in any way to denigrate the very beautiful Machame route. But these are things to bear in mind when hearing the Marangu route described as the tourist, easy or Coca Cola route and the Machame as the scenic or the whiskey route! It is true that you will hear many people who have climbed Machame say that it is better than Marangu, and this is conveyed to many of the guide book writers. But remember that the overwhelming majority of climbers only ever climb one route. The chances are that the climbers who say this have never been on the Marangu route and are simply repeating what they have been told or have read.

How is the Marangu route different from the Machame route?

Physically, the Marangu and Machame routes are rather different. The main force of Kibo's volcanic activity occurred out towards the west (the Machame side) and so Machame is steeper - especially in the first day and a half - and more rugged than Marangu. It is often considered more scenic because the views of Kibo are more impressive than from the south-east (the Marangu approach), but many consider the vegetation on day 2 of the Marangu route to be more attractive than anything seen on the western side. As always with mountains, every route has its advantages and drawbacks. The difficulty grading has Marangu as a 1, and Machame a 1+, so there's not a great deal in it.

How do I cope with change of altitude?

Always remember to maintain a slow, steady pace from beginning to end. Going slowly allows the body to acclimatize while hiking. Those who start out too quickly will have troubles higher up the mountain as the body will be overexerted. This still holds true if you are spending an extra day on

How long does it take to reach the sum-

It will depend on the route you pick and your pace. It can take from 4-8 hours to reach the summit from the high camp.

What is an anorak?

A weatherproof jacket, such as Gore-tex.

Why do we make the final ascent in the pre-dawn darkness?

Most groups will start for the summit on ascent day at 11 PM to 12:30AM, depending on the perceived fitness of the group, the weather and the route. The pre-dawn hours, while cold, are also the calmest and clearest. The best views from the summit are at dawn. Often clouds and high winds develop not long after sunrise making the summit much less attractive and the descent more difficult. Guides who have been to the summit scores of times report that it is very rare to find it cloudy at the summit at dawn in any season. The ascent day is a very long day of hiking. Some people may require 15 hours to reach the summit and descend

What shots should I get?

Can children climb Kilimanjaro?

The minimum age set by the National park Authorities for summiting Mt. Kilimanjaro is 12 years old. However, younger children can attempt the summit with special permission. Younger children can also trek on the mountain without reaching

How many guides, and porters and cooks do we get?

The number of staff that you will have depends on how much gear and weight is brought up the mountain, the route chosen and number of days on the mountain; however a typical trek will have (per 4 persons); 1 guide, 1 assistant guide, 1 cook, 1 waiter and 9 porters.

Are the guides trained in first aid and altitude sickness?

Kilimanjaro guide s are trained in acute mountain sickness (AMS) and basic mountain first aid. However, they are not doctors or paramedics. Climbers are responsible for bringing their own first aid kit and medical supplies.

How much is a good tip?

The typical tip is: Porters \$5 per day per porter Cooks \$8 to \$10 per cook Assistant Guides \$8 to \$10 per guide Kilimanjaro Guides \$20 per day and up per guide *Tip amounts listed for Kilimanjaro are per group, not per individual traveler. For instance, if four people are on Kili, they should each contribute \$5/ day if they want to tip the lead guide \$20."

Do you accommodate people with dietary restrictions?

Vegetarian and other special diets can be accommodated. Please let us know ahead of time and remind your guide during your trek briefing. Protein options may be minimal on a vegetarian diet, so you may want to bring protein supplements.

Can we bring something for the porters?

Donations are easier to take with you when you travel to Tanzania rather than mailing them after you get back from your trip. Porters welcome old hiking boots, warm clothing, and cash donations.

HOW TO SPEND YOUR TIME IN **MOSHI TANZANIA**

Moshi is oftentimes-underestimated destination in Tanzania. Mostly known to travellers as a gateway for Kilimanjaro climbs, but there are so many things to do in Moshi, that will keep you busy for more than a day, if

only you give it a chance!

HIKING THROUGH LOCAL **VILLAGES**

Climb on the slopes of the highest mountain Africa's to the first base camp of Marangu Route. With its 5895 meters Kilimanjaro is an impressive sight, which most visitors already spot in awe amazement when flying in at Kilimanjaro airport. The rainforest zone of Kilimanjaro is thick and lush and home to many different bird and monkey species, such as blue monkeys or colobus. Make sure to keep your ears wide open to hear some of Kilimanjaro's residents.

HIKE TO **MARANGU** WATERFALLS -HOME OF THE CHAGGA TRIBE

Immerse yourself in the history Marangu and its people. Marangu, at the lower slopes of Kilimanjaro, is a small town with a great amount of history and ancient traditions. Get carried away by the Chagga tribe, unique rainforest landscape and coffee growing insides. If you want to swim in chilly waters don't forget to bring swimming suit a rope swing that makes tha as waterfall lagune is safe for swimming.

HIKE TO **MATERUNI** WATERFALLS

Materuni Waterfalls hike from Moshi is not just a hike but only an opportunity to dip in cold lagune beneath the waterfalls. It's less than AFRICAN FABan hour walk from nearby village. With 150 m height it is considered the highest waterfall at Kilimanjaro region. If you want to swim in chilly waters don't forget to bring swimming suit as waterfall lagune is safe for swimming.

DAY TRIP TO LAKE CHALA

Lake Chala is located about 45 minutes drive from Moshi at a place called Himo. Although it is situated outside of the Kilimanjaro national park, the lake is an important geological link to the park. It draws its water via underground streams that originate form Kilimanjaro. This deep fresh water lake can be visited prior or after climbing the mountain.

NOTE: It is not possible to swim in this lake.

TRIP TO KIKULETWA **HOT SPRINGS**

Yes, Tanzania is full of surprises and Kikuletwa springs is one of them! If you want to escape from hustle and bustle in Moshi, Kikuletwa hot springs is the best place to hide. One of the rare places that look exactly the same as you see on the internet pictures. Lagoon has warm water that is pleasant to swim in and little fish nibbling your toes. There is huge tree with Kikuletwa hotspings even more enjoyable and fun and opportunity to unleash your inner Tarzan.

GO ON MOSHI MARKET - BUY TANZANIAN SOUVENIRS, KANGA **AND OTHER RICS**

Moshi market is just the right size but so much colourful and vibrant place that should definitely be visited. In case you have to stock your self with some food, its also cheaper than Arusha market. If the season is right, buy some avocados and mangos! Whether you are on the lookout for the perfect item or just want to experience market life, we can show you around the best markets in Moshi, Arusha, Dar Es Salaam, and Stone Town.

If you stroll around Moshi town, you will notice many colourful shops with African printed fabrics, that is used for Kanga. Again, like all products in Moshi, fabrics are cheaper too and if you want to take home some nice designs, this is the time for Kanga shopping. Tanzania's population includes around 120 different African tribal groups. The largest group is the Sukuma, who live in the north-western part of the country, south of Lake Victoria.

The country's earliest people were hunters and gatherers, who inhabited the land as far back as 5000BC. Around 800AD, traders moved to the country from India, Arabia and Persia (present day Iran), creating a diverse mix of peoples and cultures.


Today, about 90 percent of Tanzanians live in the rural areas and live off what they can grow on the land. In more recent years, however, people have started to migrate from the countryside to developing towns and cities. A range of different religions are followed across Tanzania. Approximately one third of the population are Muslim, one third are Christians, and the remaining third follow traditional African religions. The country's favourite sports are football and boxing.

SECURITY

Tanzania is a safe country to travel in.

Tanzanians are warm - hearted and generous people and are eager to help visitors get the most out of their stay. Hotels are safe and have watchmen. Tanzania is a politically stable, multi-democratic country. However, as in all countries, a little common sense goes a long way and reasonable precautions should still betaken, such as locking valuables in the hotel safe and not walking alone at night.

Tanzania has a number of important national parks and nature reserves – such as the Selous Game Reserve, where one of the largest populations of elephants live, and The Gombe Stream National Park, where animal expert Dr Jane Goodall carried out her famous research on chimps in their natural habitat. The Serengeti National Park, Tanzania's oldest and most popular park for tourists, is home to over 1.7 million wildebeest and about a million other animals.



Get more information about the culinary culture of the Maasai while tasting a traditional tea (chai) prepared on the wood fire. A tasty lunch with a variety of local food highlights will end the activities inside the village. The afternoon starts with an exciting & very educational walking safari across the nearby bush. Maasai warriors will guide you along their trees, tracks and the local wildlife. In addition to that, the usage of local tools, hunting techniques and fire preparation is a part your unforgettable bush excursion. Coming back to the village, the well-deserved break is accompanied by of Maasai men and woman gathering around for the traditional singing & dancing performances. A great BBQ-Buffet right at camp fire and the "get together "with your already known Maasai friends, will provide you an unforgettable evening under the (mostly) starry sky. The evening will find the end at your private Maasai house on traditional beds with comfortable mats & blankets. After hearing the rhythm of the bush drums next morning, the breakfast with freshly baked rolls, jam, fruits and an omelet of your choice is waiting for you! Later, during the still early morning, the tour is over and it's time to say good bye with many new impressions in your mind. Your driver will bring you back to your hotel in Moshi.


